# Citizenship and PSHE Department.

The intent of Citizenship/PSHE at Bromfords is to develop and broaden understanding of a range of social, cultural and personal issues in order to prepare students for life in modern Britain; to explore how to be a good citizen and ways in which they can contribute positively to society; to allow students the opportunity to challenge and question moral and ethical issues to better understand the world around them.

### Achieve:

As students progress, their ability to form and articulate well informed viewpoints on a range of social, moral and personal issues should develop. This will ensure that they are developing understanding on these topics but are also able to consider varying perspectives to their own.

### Enrich:

The application of the knowledge gained, will enable students to make informed and positive choices in life outside of school. It will also ensure that students are aware of how decisions they make have consequences for themselves and those around them which will make them more positive members of society.

### Prepare:

The study of this subject ensures that students are equipped for life both during and after Bromfords. Although not offered as a GCSE/A-Level subject, the skills developed will enable students to make positive life choices and ensures that they have an understanding of key elements within a range of personal, social, ethical and moral issues.
